### THE MAKEOVER

#### Shower + Tub

Tanya and Nichole sourced a standard sub but had a teak agron applied to the front for a custom look. (They sealed the panel to protect if from water and moisture.) The pair also removed the unsightly heat register above the sub, replacing it with in-floor healing. While the busilehead couldn't be removed completely, it was simmed down and pushed closer to the exterior wall. This allowed the designers to mount the showerhead a little higher

#### Tile

The designers chose inexpensive subway site to cover the length of one will and the wet zone. To keep the space looking edgy and less traditional, they installed it in a 90-degree herringbone pattern. (Herringbone tile can be more expensive to install than a typical running bond pattern, so budget accordingly). Tanya and Keichle opted for white grout, instead of the dark grey they used for the left fooring to heep the bathroom feeling

#### Vanity

Owners Ryan and Leanne had their hearts set on converting a mid-century sideboard into a vanity, and came across a teak cabinet on Craigslist: "But upon inspection, our carpenter realized the sides and top were a thin veneer that couldn't be refinished!" says Tarya, "He ended up removing the top and gables and replacing them with solid teak. In the end, it looks fartastic and definitely has the character we were after."

#### BIGGEST COMPROMISE

"We had originally specified a flat-grain, black walnut door, but because the doors had to carry throughout the entire basement, the cost was prohibitive. We ended up using birch and staining it to try and get the depth and tone of walnut "

#### LESSON LEARNED

"Using found furniture as a vanity is not always the easiest process. Try to find the piece of furniture you want to use ahead of time, and design or build the space around it. And don't think that converting a vintage piece of furniture is necessarily going to save you money - think of it as a cool. reclaimed statement piece."
